ABOUT TODAY'S READINGS

You are encouraged to participate fully in this service from wherever you may be this morning. The service is taken from the Book of Common Prayer and other sources approved by The Episcopal Church. It has been printed in this bulletin for your ease of use and convenience. Please join in the prayers and responses printed in bold.

Welcome to Saint Barnabas's Church. Today we continue the seasonal theme of Jesus' manifestation ("epiphany") as the Son of God. John the Baptist's arrest ended his ministry and now Jesus returns to Galilee and begins his public ministry with the call to repent and the calling of his first disciples. Thus, he announced that in him God's Kingdom has been initiated.

The Old Testament reading is Jonah's proclamation of judgment on the city of Nineveh. The city repents and God's punishment is averted.

We continue to read a portion of 1 Corinthians as we do each Epiphany season. The Church is to live at all times as though the end is near, which Paul believed it was. The Kingdom of God is near and we should conform our lives to the urgency of the moment. Many Christians may feel that these words should not be treated as an absolute rule in light of the fact that the end did not come immediately, as Paul had first thought it would. Nevertheless, his underlying principle does apply: live always in preparation for the end.

We celebrate in the community of faith as those living in the in-between times. We are at once the disciples of the Lord and his Body in the world and yet sinners who are called to repent. We celebrate Eucharist remembering his death and proclaiming his resurrection, while also looking for his coming again.

The word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time, saying, "Get up, go to Nineveh, that great city, and proclaim to it the message that I tell you." So Jonah set out and went to Nineveh, according to the word of the Lord. Now Nineveh was an exceedingly large city, a three days' walk across. Jonah began to go into the city, going a day's walk. And he cried out, "Forty days more, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!" And the people of Nineveh believed God; they proclaimed a fast, and everyone, great and small, put on sackcloth. When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God's mind was changed about the calamity that God would bring upon them; and God did not do it.

Reader: The Word of the Eternal One.

We now pray Psalm [62:6-14] with one voice and heart

All:

For God alone my soul in silence waits; truly, there is my hope. God alone is my rock and my salvation, my stronghold, so that I shall not be shaken. Those of high degree are but a fleeting breath, even those of low estate cannot be trusted. On the scales they are lighter than a breath; all of them together. Put no trust in extortion; in robbery take no empty pride; though wealth

increase, set not your heart upon it. God has spoken once, twice have I heard it, that power belongs to God. Steadfast love is yours, O God, for you repay everyone according to their deeds.

I mean, brothers and sisters, the appointed time has grown short; from now on, let even those who have wives be as though they had none, and those who mourn as though they were not mourning, and those who rejoice as though they were not rejoicing, and those who buy as though they had no possessions, and those who deal with the world as though they had no dealings with it. For the present form of this world is passing away.

The number of vestrypersons within these parameters may be changed with two (2) consecutive vestry votes. Two or more members of the same household or family shall not serve concurrently on the vestry.

4.3 <u>Delegates</u>

The Patish shall have such Delegates to the Diocesan Convention and to the Deanery Assembly as it may be entitled to under the relevant canons and rules. Delegates may be members of the Vestry.

ARTICLE 5
ELECTIONS, TERMS OF OFFICE AND VACANCIES

5.1 Elections

The Wardens, Treasurer, Clerk, Vestrypersons, and High School Representative shall be elected at each Annual Meeting of the Parish. The Wardens, Treasurer, shall be elected at each Annual Meeting of the Parish. The Wardens, Treasurer, Clark and the High School Representative shall hold their position until the next Annual Meeting, and the Vestrypersons until the third Annual Meeting following their election, and all shall hold their office until their successors are elected, and quality.
